MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR

Advising her approval April 2, 2015, of Enrolled **SBs 28, 109, 115, 215** and **338**.

Advising her veto April 6, 2015, of Enrolled **SB 346**.

The veto message reads as follows:

To The Honorable President Pro Tempore
And Members Of The Oklahoma Senate
First Session Of The
Fifty Fifth Oklahoma Legislature

Enrolled Senate Bill No. 346:

This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me by Section 11 of Article VI of the Oklahoma Constitution to approve or object to legislation presented to me, I have VETOED Senate Bill 346.

Although I vetoed an almost identical Bill last session (Senate Bill 2080), Senate Bill 346 would create what the authors titled, "The Governor's Transparency Act of 2015." I maintain the concern I did last session.

Senate Bill 346 would require state agencies provide the relevant appropriate legislative committee with a copy of any Memorandum of Understanding or Agreement (MOU) entered into during that legislative session. This requirement does not exist for state agencies when the legislature is not in session.

The Bill also mandates state agencies to publish a "detailed accounting" regarding every MOU within fifteen (15) days of an MOU's effective date on the agency's website and *documents.ok.gov* website. Despite the fact that every MOU which is the subject of this bill is already available through the provisions of the Oklahoma Open Records Act, Senate Bill 346 places an enormous administrative burden on these state agencies by requiring this lengthy and cumbersome accounting for every MOU, whether significant or insignificant. Senate Bill 346 imposes burdensome and a needless administrative mandate on state agencies, which diminishes a state agency's ability to achieve its core mission and delays delivery of important services.

Consistent with my continued support of government transparency, I encourage all state agencies and entities, appropriated and non-appropriated, to post all significant MOU's on their websites and to make them available to the public upon request, but I will not impose cumbersome reporting mandates. Such a requirement is not consistent with the principles of efficient and better government.
