The Commission also enforces other ethics laws as prescribed by law including SB 1745 (2014) and amendments thereto concerning political subdivision campaigns and financial disclosure of certain officers.

Budget cuts and caps on fee revenue prevented the continuation of the program due to vacancies in both the Deputy Director and Director of Compliance positions.

Extremely Negatively. The Commission's ability to use its revolving fund to offset appropriation deficiency was siginificantly limited in 2019 through a \$150,000 cap. The Commission' inability to utilize carryover funding likewise limits its ability to offset or otherwise accomodate appropriation deficiency or unexpected costs. Commission has a \$96,000 unexpected expense as a result of federal lawsuit and Commission is unable to accomodate this unexpected costs through fee revenue. constitutional priority is investigation of alleged violations of Ethics Rules. Investigations, Education, Advice, Customer Service, Filing Assistance, policy development are all negatively impacted by continued underappropriation.
